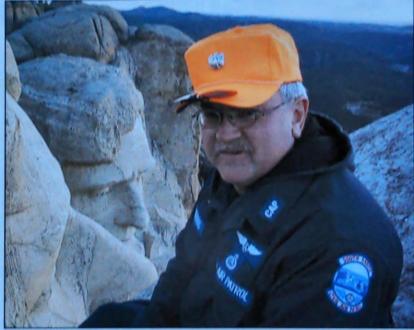
"Rufrider" Takes the South Dakota Reins

SPRING CLEANING:

A Reminder About Aircraft Issues

- The inventory of items in the aircraft should have been completed at the start of the month.
 Complete an inventory for each new month.
- Ensure the end of month Tach and Hobbs times are annotated. And on the new sheet, enter the beginning of month times.
- Enter dates and Tach times for all inspections due on both sheets.
- Ensure any aircraft write-ups not fixed on the old sheet get entered on the new sheet.
- Check to see at the top of the sheet that the month is entered and the dates the aircraft was in your location is entered.
- If the aircraft had any maintenance done during the month, ensure the dates are on the bottom of the form.
- · Always double check entries for accuracy.

TACH SHEETS: Use the remarks column if you are moving an aircraft or doing anything unusual on the flight. Use the remarks column for anything other than typical proficiency flights or SARs/SAREX. It really helps operations to know what is being done and helps when a pilot makes an error on mission symbols.

MISSION NUMBER: B12 mission number for those pilots who were pre-approved by email to the State Director on mission number SD04-011. Note, if you fly one of these missions, you are to be using one of the scenarios listed in attachment 9 of CAPR 60-1. See chapter 4 for details.

EMERGENCY SERVICES: Operations is concerned about funding the wing will receive for ES training this year. It is tied to the number of mission pilots and observers the wing has in MIMS. All pilots should complete Part 1 and Part 2 of the ES test. Also, renewing members must take the new ES Test 117. There are 3 parts to this test, de-

pending on what skills new pilots are renewing. It is suggest that all current 101 card holders take the 117 tests now.

MIMS: When you look at MIMS, you will find most previous dates for when you completed training are gone. That's because of the new skills tied to re-currency training. This does not affect your current status as qualified in your skills. But, as you approach the 3-year expiration, all new dates will have to be entered to show you qualified in the latest task guides. This can be done in a one-step entry process. When the time comes, I expect you will need to submit your paperwork showing completion to the wing and we will enter the data. Those of you who are expiring soon need to begin work on completing the task guides. For mission pilots, there is an exception to doing the task guides - a Form 91, still done every 2 years, fulfills the requirements.

All the info discussed above for ES training is found in Chapter 2 of 60-3, dated May 04.

AIRCRAFT: With summer fast approaching, let's get the planes washed. Wipe the oil down and clean them up. Annotate on the Tach Sheets when this has been accomplished. All units should do this as soon as possible, especially with some plane swaps coming up. The wash should be done prior to aircraft moves.

SWAPS: Operations will determine this by who has not been flying much in the last several months.

MAINTENANCE: The planes will be inspected in May as part of our inspection from the USAF. We need all problems cleared as soon as possible. If there are maintenance issues, contact Chief of Maintenance, Maj Jerry Densmore.

Wing Participates in Exercise with American Red

The South Dakota Wing joined the Black Hills Chapter of the American Red Cross to explore areas of possible mutual support during a simulated tornado strike on a small rural town

on October 9.

That Friday, the Red Cross opened a shelter for the simulated victims, played by Civil Air Patrol (CAP) personnel. The following day, American Red Cross (ARC) personnel exercised their family services and ass care functions, administering to the needs of exercise participants.

The highlight of the exercise was the ARCs damage assessment function. In this scenario, and in other disaster situations. the affected area was not immediately accessible to ARC workers due to safety and other concerns. Any delay in the damage assessment function delays relief being provided to the ARC

clients.

Using CAP's new Satellite Digital Imaging System, a South Dakota Wing aircrew was tasked with providing the approximate latitude and longitude of the edges of the affected area. They took a series of photos, ranging from an overhead view of the entire area to a close-up shot of the damage to a specific residence. These were transmitted to the ARC personnel waiting at the incident command

American Red Cross damage assessment specialists from the Black Hills Chapter were impressed with the technology and pleased with the quick results. They felt that these preliminary aerial photographs would greatly expedite getting critical aid to victims who have suffered losses due to a tornado, flood, earthquake or other disas-

SAFETY: Microwave Using Plastic Containers Maybe Hazardous To Your Health

Dioxin Carcinogens cause cancer, especially breast cancer. Don't freeze your plastic water bottles with water as this also releases dioxins in the plastic according to a study by John Hopkins University and Walter Reed Army Medical Center. Dr. Edward Fujimoto from Castle hospital was on a TV program explaining this health hazard. Dr Fujimoto is the manager of the Wellness Program at Walter Reed Army Medical Center.

He was talking about dioxins and how bad they are for us. He said that we should not be heating our food in the microwave using plastic containers. This applies to foods that contain fat. Dr Fujimoto explained that the combination of fat, high heat and plastics releases dioxins into the food and ultimately into the cells of the body. Dioxins are carcinogens and highly toxic to the cells of our bodies. Instead, he recommends using glass, Corning Ware, or ceramic containers for heating food. You get the same results, without the dioxins.

So such things as TV din-

ners, instant ramen and soups, etc., should be removed from the container and heated in something else. Paper isn't bad but you don't know what is in the paper, It's just safer to use tempered glass, Corning Ware, etc. He said we might remember when some of the fast food res-

taurants moved away from the foam containers to paper. The dioxin problem is one of the reasons. To add to this, Saran wrap placed over foods as they are nuked, with the high heat, actually drips poisonous toxins into the food, use paper towels.

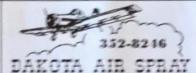

PILOT SAFETY:

Clean Wings Are Happy Wings

The first three paragraphs say it all. The statement — a 1 or 2 mm cube per Cm Sq can decrement lift by 22% — reflects a degree of impairment clearly unknown by most pilots. The professional ice-investigation community has been talking about this for some time but usually in regards to tail plane icing and loss of pitch authority — usually in "T" tail airplanes.

"Clean Wings are Happy Wings" — with the possible exception of the A-45...

Where we all become complacent is in the issue of loss of lift vs. what we habitually require from the airplane. If we lose ~ 25% of wing lift due to frost contamination it's effects have probably been masked by late rotations — higher IAS at lift-off — and operation reasonably below MTOGW.

If the operation is marginal in ground effect, it's unsat once out of it. Case in point: A check-carrying C-310 departed a field in Arizona around a month ago during a snow storm. His take-off-roll was >5,000' and he al-

CAP Fly A Teacher Program

In an effort to provide teachers with the tools to excite their students in aerospace, CAP can now provide opportunities for our Aerospace Education Members (educator CAP members) in your state to participate in the CAP Fly A Teacher program.

Civil Air Patrol Aerospace Education Members (AEM), are allowed to take an orientation flight on a CAP aircraft. These would be "C-19" missions using qualified cadet orientation flight pilots, and they would provide the same information as provided in Syllabus #7, Normal Flight Maneuvers. The estimated time is 1 hour (this includes preflight description and performance, and the in-flight demonstration includes trimming for level flight; point out the stability of the airplane in hands off flight; emphasize attitude flying; demonstrate use of trim controls and straight flying to a checkpoint using visual references; discuss the effects of lift, drag, and gravity on the airplane; discuss the relationship of lift, angle of attack, and relative wind; demonstrate a shallow banked turn and point out how the airplane will maintain the turn with controls neutral; explain load factor during turns; and answer post-flight questions while stressing safety).

All AEMs are going to be notified by letter about this program offering. If interested, they will contact NHQ staff to ask for help in coordinating the orientation flights. Please let us know if your Wing wishes to participate in the CAP Fly A Teacher Program.

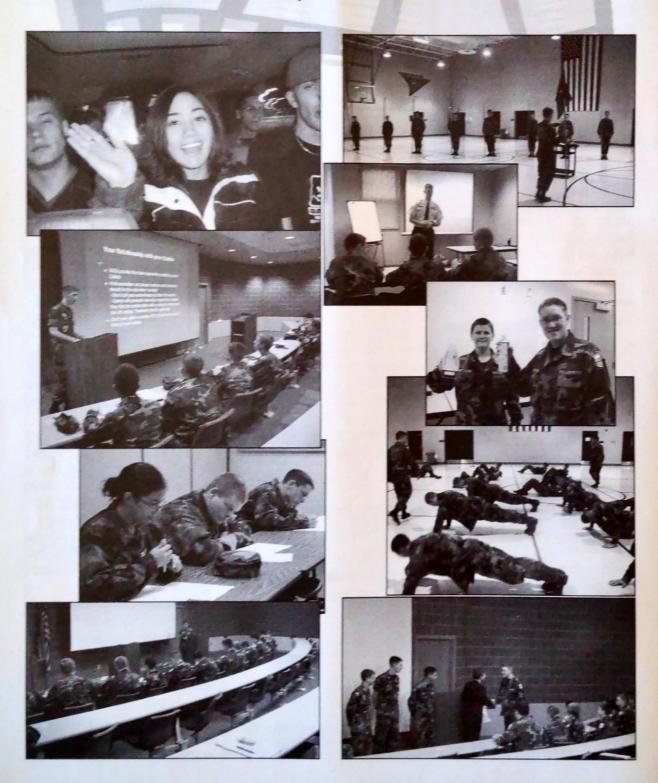

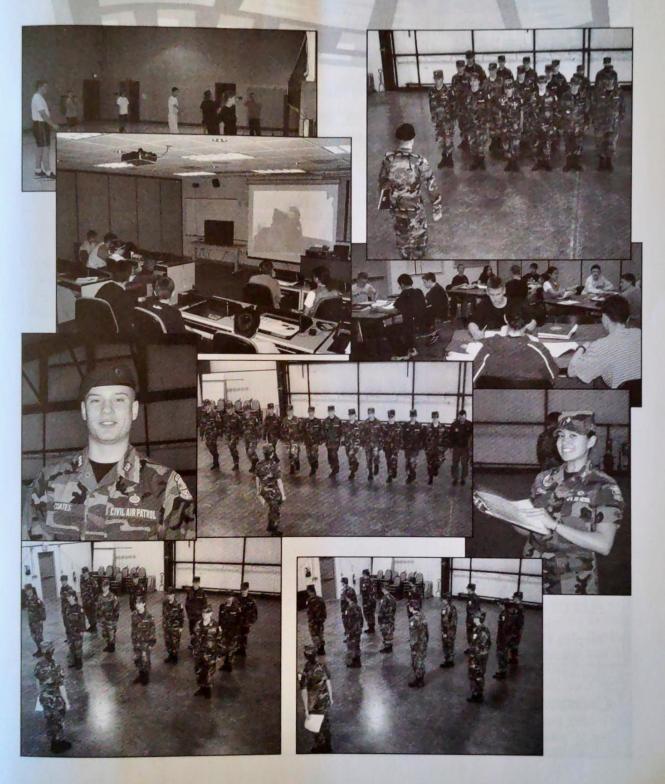

CAP Rolls Out New High-tech Aerial Imaging System

"... first operational airborne hyperspectral imaging system in the world."

Civil Air Patrol officially rolled out the nation's first fully operational hyperspectral-imaging system during a ceremony March 2 at the Fort Belvoir's Davison Army Airfield near Washington, D.C.

The new high-tech aerialimaging system, dubbed AR-CHER for Airborne Real-time Cueing Hyperspectral Enhanced Reconnaissance, will make CAP more effective in its search and rescue, disaster relief, counterdrug, and homeland security missions.

"To the best of my knowledge, this is the first operational airborne hyperspectral imaging system in the world," said Col Robert Gaudette of the Air Force Research Laboratory at Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, Ohio, one of several dignitaries attending the rollout.

"CAP's spearheading such a project for civilian use is a tribute to the commitment and determination of our members," said CAP National Commander Maj Gen Dwight H. Wheless. "It took almost four years of dedicated work to complete this project."

Key to the process, General Wheless said, were support and assistance provided by the Naval Research Laboratory, Air Force Research Laboratory and Coast Guard Research and Development Center. "This is the largest interagency project in CAP's 63-year history," General Wheless said.

Also included in the AR-CHER team were Gippsland Aeronautics, which provided the aerial platform for the system with its GA8 Airvan, NovaSol Corporation of Honolulu, which provided hardware, and Space Computer Corporation of Los Angeles, which provided the software.

"Using hyperspectral-imaging equipment onboard an aircraft, we can identify an object on the ground as small as one meter in size from half a mile in the air," General Wheless said.

Wheless said the HSI sensor detects an object by looking for and identifying its spectral signature, the way the object reflects light. Airborne ARCHER operators can program the target object's spectral signature into the system in advance or, in the absence of such a signature, set the system to search for anomalies — objects significantly different from the surrounding

area. Data on possible targets that match the sought-for spectral signatures or anomalies can be processed in real time, stored and analyzed, and transmitted to ground teams. Since the system relies on reflected light, it cannot detect objects at night, underwater, under dense cover, underground, under snow or inside buildings.

"Despite these minor limitations, you can see how HSI will greatly increase CAP's effectiveness in aerial reconnaissance," said Col Drew Alexa. director of the CAP Advanced Technologies Group. "CAP already has satellite-transmitted digital-imaging systems in place throughout the nation. We can use HSI to capture images in the air and then transmit them to the ground via e-mail in two minutes or less, using a satellite phone. With such rapid response, ground operators can quickly see if they need to redirect the aircraft or deploy ground teams to a particular location."

Colonel Alexa said CAP will deploy 16 ARCHER systems to strategic locations throughout the nation.

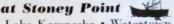

(Dr.) John Kershenstein of the Naval Research Laboratory; Dr. Robert Gaudette of the Air Force Research Laboratory; and CAP leaders General Wheless and Colonel Alexa.

Other dignitaries attending included: Michael Dominguez, assistant secretary of the Air Force for Manpower and Reserve Affairs; former CAP national commanders Maj Gen Richard L. Bowling and Brig Gen Paul M. "Every day our superb CAP members demonstrate their professionalism and training," Lt Col Buechler added, "The same standards you embrace in CAP you should at home, work or play."

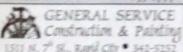

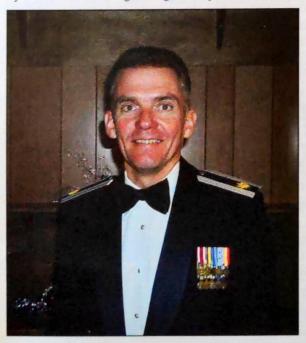
Maj Ron Mele Earns Master CFI Rating

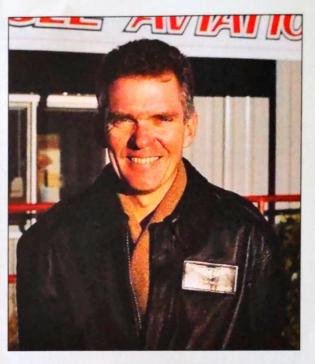

The National Association of Flight Instructors (NAFI) announced a significant aviation accomplishment on the part of Maj Ronald Mele, an Eagle Aviation flight instructor and a member of the Lookout Mountain Composite Squadron in Spearfish, SD on March 28. Smile, © Your Picture Is Going On Your Pilot License

With passage of the National Intelligence Reform Act of 2004, the FAA is required to begin issuing improved pilot certificates within a year. The certificates must be resistant to tampering and counterfeiting, include a photo of the pilot and possibly store biometric information. The bill does not require pilots to immediately replace existing certificates with new photo certificates. Most likely, pilots would get a photo license when they add a new rating or certificate, change their address or request a certificate to replace a lost or damaged one. Also under the new law, the Transportation Security Administration (TSA) will be required to check the names of potential air-charter customers against government terrorist watch lists if an operator requests it. The new law mandates that the TSA establish a system whereby aircharter operators with aircraft weighing more than 12,500 pounds mtow can contact the TSA with the names of charter passengers to be screened against no-fly lists. The operator has the right to refuse service to any potential customer whose name shows up on a watch list.

CAP On Cutting Edge With New Glass Cockpit Cessna

Civil Air Patrol took delivery of its first Cessna C-182T Skylane — equipped with the Garmin G1000 glass cockpit — at the Cessna manufacturing plant in Independence, Kansas, on March 16.

CAP is ordering 40 Cessna 182s and one Cessna 206 with glass cockpits to replace older aircraft in CAP's single-engine fleet.

"It's important for CAP to use the best that technology has to offer," said CAP National Commander Maj Gen Dwight H. Wheless. "The Garmin system integrates the aircraft's primary flight, engine and sensor data and displays it on two fullcolor LCD screens in the cockpit. That gives the pilot greater situational awareness and makes him more effective - and safer - as he or she flies our CAP missions. Since the safety of our members is our number-one concern, we're especially enthusiastic about this new technology."

CAP owns a fleet of 550 single-engine piston aircraft strategically located throughout the United States. Most are Cessna C-172 and C-182 models that are used in a variety of aerial imaging, communications, emergency transport and reconnaissance missions.

The G1000 system includes

fully-integrated navigational and communications equipment, according to CAP National Headquarters Executive Director Al Allenback, a retired Air Force fighter pilot. The high-wing Cessna Skylane seats four and can fly about five hours between stops for refueling. With full fuel it can carry 600 pounds of crew and cargo. The aircraft cruises at

"Glass cockpits are the future," Mr. Allenback said. "Safety, reliability, and situational awareness are all enhanced. Personally, I prefer instrument flight with the glass cockpit because the cross-check and trend information are all presented on one multifunction display."

CAP will celebrate delivery of its first glass cockpitequipped Skylane on March 16. CAP and Cessna leaders will gather for the official transfer of keys at Cessna's single-engine aircraft manufacturing plant in Independence. approximately 155 mph. CAP members use the Skylane for search and rescue, disaster relief, counterdrug reconnaissance, and homeland security missions. Its features allow CAP to fly "low and slow" for aerial imaging.

CAP frequently uses the C-182 as a platform for missions requiring satellite-transmitted digital imaging. In those cases, the Skylane's interior layout accommodates the crew and equipment necessary to take digital photos from the air and transmit them immediately via

satellite phone and laptop to personnel on the ground. CAP used this system to transmit more than 1,000 photos from Cessna aircraft last summer to support relief efforts after four major hurricanes swept the Southeast. The Florida Emergency Management Agency relied heavily on CAP imagery to determine where to send emergency responders. All of CAP's new C-182s will come equipped with this high-tech satellite-transmitted digital-imaging system.

Cessna officials said the company is pleased to be part of an ongoing partnership with the CAP. Jack J. Pelton, chairman, president and CEO of Cessna Aircraft, remembers that CAP took delivery of its first Independence-built Skyhawks back in August, 1997 — just over one year from the grand opening of the Cessna Single Engine facility.

"We are proud to be able to provide CAP with safe, reliable aircraft to accomplish their often times life-saving missions," Mr. Pelton said.
